Strengthen the growth of disabilities ministries by educating church leaders with the seven major disability groups.

Initiate advocacy teams ensuring full church and community inclusion through activities including worship, education, fellowship, outreach, and leadership roles.

Maintain necessary resources for building an informed church and community using workshops, Disability Awareness Sabbaths, webinars, and literature.

Plan activities to showcase skills and talents of people with disabilities highlighting Bible studies, baptisms, and community service.

Listen with patience the need and desire of people with disabilities to participate in all church activities especially children's church, pathfinders, Youth 4 Inclusion, and adult programs for those who cannot attend church.

Encourage parents, guardians, and other family members with adults and children with disabilities to participate in building an inclusive ministry.

7 MAJOR DISABILITY GROUPS

Cognitive

A cognitive disability affects a person's ability to comprehend what is seen or heard, and then infer information from social subtleties and body language. Cognitive disabilities may include, but are not limited to, autism, learning disabilities, Down Syndrome, and traumatic brain injuries.

Hearing

A hearing disability affects a person's ability to hear sounds and, in some instances, the ability to discriminate speech. Hearing disabilities may range from mild to severe to profound hearing loss. Hearing disability does not include those who identify with the Deaf community.

Hidden

A hidden disability is a physical or mental condition that is not easily recognized.

Hidden disabilities may include, but are not limited to, arthritis, hypertension, heart disease, diabetes, cancers, lupus, epilepsy, or a host of other conditions from A - Z.

Mobility

A mobility disability is an impairment that limits the individual's ability to perform the activities of daily living. The individual may need assistance or use a cane, walker, or wheelchair in moving from one place to the other.

Psychiatric [Mental]

A psychiatric disability is a mental disorder that may affect daily living. This may include, but is not limited to, Altered Perception Syndrome, bipolar disorder, and phobias.

Speech

A speech disability affects a person's ability to communicate and can be characterized as language and voice disorders, articulation errors, disfluency or stuttering.

Visual

A visual disability affects a person's ability to see. This can include, but is not limited to, wearing glasses or contact lenses to correct vision, glaucoma, cataracts, or blindness.
